Note: The geographical areas presented in this report are based on 2021 geographical boundaries. Any statistics found in this report do not reflect the recent (early 2023) local governance changes that have occurred in New Brunswick.

Introduction¹

New Brunswick's Southwest region consists of three counties: Saint John, Kings and Charlotte. Combined, these three counties encompass a total land area of 8,362 square kilometres.


The majority of the Southwest region's population live in the Greater Saint John Area (which consists of the City of Saint John, the towns of Quispamsis and Rothesay, and a number of smaller communities). Outside of the Greater Saint John Area, some of the notable communities in the region include Sussex, and Saint Andrews. At the time of the 2021 Census, rural areas² accounted for 40.4% of the region's population.

Population Trends³


As of July 1, 2023, the population of New Brunswick's Southwest region was estimated to be 184,730 (approximately 22.1% of the province's total population). This total was up slightly from where it was in the past. Between 2008 and 2023, the region's population grew by 7.7% (from 171,586 to 184,730).

This represented the forty-ninth largest increase among Canada's seventy-six economic regions during this time. This growth was spread throughout the region.



² A population centre has a population of at least 1,000 and a population density of 400 persons or more per square kilometre. All areas outside population centres are classified as rural areas. Taken together, population centres and rural areas cover all of Canada.

Recent population gains in the region have been primarily driven by a combination of international and interprovincial migration. Historically, natural population change has also contributed to growth in the region; however, since 2018, the number of deaths in the region has exceeded the number of births (with this gap expected to widen going forward).

As of July 2023, the Southwest's population had the twenty-third highest median age (44.8 years) among Canada's seventy-six economic regions. This median was slightly higher among the region's female population (46.0 years) compared to its male population (43.5 years).

Language⁵

At the time of the 2021 Census, 96.5% of the Southwest New Brunswick population's first official language⁶ was English, while 2.9% of individuals' first official language was French.



Approximately one-in-seven (14.4%) individuals in the region were able to speak in both official languages. This represented the lowest proportion among New Brunswick's five economic regions. Language capabilities and preferences were fairly uniform across the region.

Knowledge of Official Languages – Southwest N.B. – May 2021



Beyond the two official languages, some of the most common languages spoken in the Southwest were Arabic, Mandarin, Tagalog, Spanish and Korean.

Education⁸

At the time of the 2021 Census, 60.8% of the region's population aged 25 to 64 had completed some form of post-secondary education; this percentage ranked forty-first among Canada's seventy-six economic regions and was slightly above the province-wide average of 60.3%.

The Southwest was more or less on par with the province in terms of the types of credentials individuals chose to pursue (apprenticeship vs. college vs. university); however, the region did have a noticeably lower proportion of its population that had not graduated high school (8.2% within the region compared to 11.0% province-wide).






Throughout 2023, there were an average of 92,400 individuals participating in the labour force (i.e., employed or actively looking for work) in the region. In the long-term, the region has seen very little labour force growth, in part due to the significant number of retirements that have occurred in recent years.

Labour Force Growth Relative to 2008




In 2023, 60.2% of the region's population aged 15 years and over were participating in the labour force, compared to 60.5% at a provincial level, and 65.6% nationally. Among the population aged 25 to 54 years, 88.0% of individuals in the region were participating in the labour force, compared to 88.0% at a provincial level, and 88.8% nationally.

Employment Growth Relative to 2008



Population aging has had a significant effect on the unemployment rate. The growing number of retirements over the past few decades has resulted in increased job opportunities for many of those who remain in the labour force, leading to reduced unemployment levels. Between 2013 and 2023, the Southwest region saw its unemployment rate fall from 9.5% to 5.6%.

Industry¹⁰


Some of the industries that accounted for a significantly larger share of overall employment in the region compared to the country as a whole included:

- Fishing, aquaculture, and seafood product preparation and packaging
- Utilities
- Wood and paper product manufacturing
- Petroleum product manufacturing
- Business support services (e.g. call centres)

On the other hand, some of the industries that accounted for a relatively smaller share of overall employment in the region compared to the country as a whole included:

- Finance
- Information, culture and recreation
- Professional, scientific and technical services (e.g. specialized design services, scientific research. etc.)

Employment by Sector - Southwest New Brunswick - 2023



Income¹¹

In 2019, individuals aged 15 years and over in Southwest New Brunswick had an average income level of \$47,000. This was above the province-wide average of \$44,000, but below the national average of \$52,300.


Average Total Income by Age Group – 2019





In 2019, government transfers accounted for 15.0% of total aggregate income in the region, compared to 17.2% province-wide, and 12.3% nationally. Differences across regions in terms of the percentage of total income that government transfers accounted for were primarily driven by the various regions' age profiles (older populations relied more on transfers such as Old Age Security, Guaranteed Income Supplement and the Canadian Pension Plan), along with how dependent each region's labour market was on seasonal industries (regions in which seasonal employment is more common typically have a greater number of Employment Insurance beneficiaries).

Among Southwest New Brunswickers with employment income, the average amount earned was \$46,200. This was above the province-wide average of \$42,200, but below the national average of \$50,600. Among the core working-age population (aged 25 to 54 years), these averages were \$53,800, \$49,700 and \$58,400, respectively.
